

Student Leaders Drive Wellness Initiatives Across CRPS Schools

Canadian Rockies Public Schools (CRPS) is making wellness a collective priority, with student leaders at the forefront of meaningful change. On Jan. 21, 2025, Director of Learning Services Mike Shoemaker and Learning Services Coordinator Fiona Watkins presented to the board, sharing their insights into the first-ever CRPS Student Wellness Symposium, where student representatives from across the division gathered at the Rocky Mountain Resort to explore the question: "What is wellness, and how does it connect to inspiring hearts and minds?" Working alongside school wellness leads and Ever Active Schools facilitators, students reviewed school wellness data, identifying key areas for action. While findings revealed strong feelings of safety and belonging, they also highlighted concerning levels of anxiety and depression, particularly among female students. In response, school teams developed targeted initiatives, from mental health sticker systems to house-based wellness challenges aimed at boosting school spirit. The Healthy Schools

CRPS Moves Forward with Joint Election Agreements

CRPS is set to continue its collaborative approach to elections, with the Board of Trustees approving joint election agreements with the Town of Canmore, the Town of Banff, and the MD of Bighorn. These agreements, aligned with section 3 of the Local Authorities Election Act, streamline election administration by delegating operational responsibilities to municipal governments while maintaining CRPS' oversight of key electoral functions. By coordinating efforts with local municipalities, CRPS ensures a more efficient process, reducing costs and administrative workload while enhancing accessibility for voters. As election day approaches on Oct. 20, 2025, these agreements pave the way for a seamless voting experience, reinforcing CRPS' dedication to responsible governance and community collaboration.

Foundation to Oversee Development Funds

CRPS is moving forward with the creation of the Canadian Rockies Public Schools Foundation, a nonprofit corporation designed to oversee the financial management of funds generated through the Lawrence Grassi residential development project. Under this structure, the foundation will lease land to a developer, with rental income flowing into the foundation to support its charitable purpose. Set up as an arm's-length entity from CRPS, the foundation will be incorporated under the Canada Non-Profit Corporations Act and seek charitable registration with the Canada Revenue Agency. This framework ensures long-term fiscal stewardship, enabling these funds to be managed responsibly while continuing to enhance public education across the Bow Valley.

Career Exploration Opens Doors for Grade 9s

From Jan. 20 to 24, Gr. 9 students at Banff Community High School and Canmore Collegiate High School traded desks for workplaces as part of CRPS' Career Exploration Program. Partnering with over 50 Bow Valley employers, the initiative placed 88 students into handson job shadowing experiences tailored to their interests. From healthcare to hospitality, engineering to environmental conservation, students stepped into real-world roles, gaining insight into career paths and workplace expectations. Employers, including Alberta Forestry and Parks, Banff Mineral Springs Hospital, Lake Louise Ski Resort, and McElhanney Engineering, designed hands-on experiences that immersed students in meaningful work. With parents reinforcing learning at home, the program continues to showcase the power of collaboration, bridging the gap between education and career aspirations in tangible, lasting ways.
